### Why you should take this class?

This class introduces the fundamental concepts underlying the governments of the United States and the State of Nevada. It is designed for those with no previous background in political science.

### Requirements

You are expected to participate actively and intelligently in class discussions. As a rule of thumb, you should plan to spend about an hour or two going over your notes from the readings and preparing for class each week after you have completed the readings. More than 2 unexcused absences or unprepared sessions in classes meeting twice a week will jeopardize your class participation grade.

### Exams and papers

There will be four exams. The examinations include multiple choice and essays. Students are required to bring scantron forms, a number 2 pencil, and a blue book.

### WebCampus

### Policies
