This course is an introduction to the study of international relations and world politics. Lectures and readings in the first part of the course will define important terms and compare different theories of international politics. The second part of the course will discuss international organizations, international law and security. The final part of the course will cover the politics of international economic relations, with a focus on trade, monetary relations, capital flows, and development.

Requirements, Grading, and Other Policies

Lecture and Discussion: The class will meet Monday through Fridays from 9:40-11:10 AM for lectures and discussion. Students are expected to finish all of the assigned readings and to be prepared for discussion.

Exams and Grades: There will be two exams: a mid-term examination (July 23) and a final exam (August 10). The exams use an essay format. The mid-term exam counts for 45 percent of your final grade, while the final exam counts for 50 percent. Five percent of your grade is based on class participation in discussion groups.

Make-up exams will be given only if the student can demonstrate she/he was absent due to illness or participation in an official university function. Students must provide an excuse in writing from a licensed health care provider or from a university administrator.
