

## **EOH 740 - Fundamentals of Environmental Health Fall 2017**

Course Content: This course will discuss the chemical, physical and biological factors in the environment and their interactions with the human activities. These interactions typically impact both the quality of life and environment. Special attention will be given to the following topics: 1) Population Growth and Environmental Stress, 2) Vector-borne and Foodborne Illnesses, 3) Toxic Substances and Risk Assessment, 4) Energy, Air Pollution, and Climate Change, 5) Water Resources and Water Pollution, and 6) Solid Waste Management. Upon completion of this course, each student will have a broad knowledge of the environmental health discipline and acquainted with the most important issues and challenges to be addressed in this field.

Class Format: Class format will consist of lectures and discussions. In addition to the textbook, research or review papers will assigned for you to read in advance for discussion in class. You may be called on during any class period to participate in the discussion, so it is imperative that you read the papers and prepare. These papers will be posted in WebCampus and announced in class. Material from the lecture, textbook, and assigned papers will all be included in the exams.

Lecture Note: Each lecture will be available to you through the internet-based WebCampus program at least 1 day before the class. The course is listed in WebCampus as EOH 740, section 1001. These notes should be brought to class and used to assist you in your learning experience. However, these notes are not to be used as a substitute for coming to class. These notes provide you with a tentative outline of the material, but are subject to change based on the rate of class progression. You are responsible for any changes, announcements, or assignments given during class time. Supplemental reading material will also be posted on WebCampus for you.

Exams/Grading: There will be a total of three exams: **two midterm exams** and a **final exam**, worth **50 points each**. The final will be comprehensive, covering material presented both before (50%) and after (50%) the 2<sup>nd</sup> midterm. Each student will also be required to write a **research paper** focusing on Environmental Health organizations with a minimum of 9 double-spaced typed pages (11 page maximum), worth **50 points**, due on **November 14, 2016**. The paper should be appropriately referenced and must include a complete bibliography (at least 5 references). An **oral presentation** of the research paper will be given by each student, worth **25 points**. Class participation will include attendance and group discussion, worth **25 points**, for a total of **250 points** for the course.

Research Paper: Each student will identify an environmental health organization to conduct his/her research. The organization can be at local, state, national, or international level and can

be governmental, nonprofit, charitable, or private entities. For example, Eco-USA's website contains a list of environmental organizations (<http://www.eco-usa.net/orgs/index.shtml>) in the United States. The Research paper should include: 1) Introduction, 2) Approach, 3) Impacts, 4) Challenges, and 5) Summary and Conclusion. The "Introduction" should introduce the environmental health issue(s), mission of the organization, and how its mission aligns with the issue(s). The "Approach" section should explain methods and tools the organization employs to achieve their objectives. Significant accomplishments and challenges should be discussed in the respective sections, and all the findings should be summarized in the conclusion of the research paper. Higher grades will be given to original information from the students' research, which may result from: 1) attending the activities or presentation held by the organization; 2) volunteering at the organization; 3) interviewing the organization staffs; and 4) studying/reviewing publications of the organization. Less grades will be given to secondary information from online or other introductory articles authored by other researchers.

**\*ALL PAPER TOPICS MUST BE CLEARED WITH THE INSTRUCTOR PRIOR TO BEGINNING ANY RESEARCH. PLEASE IDENTIFY A TOPIC AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. TOPICS WILL BE ASSIGNED ON A FIRST COME FIRST SERVED BASIS.**

**\*For Ph.D. students, they are required to obtain original information from the organization for their paper and, in a separate section of their paper (2 pages minimum), recommend strategies to address challenges of the organization and provide an analysis on the possible outcomes of such strategies. In addition, Ph.D. students will be given an essay question that is tied to their qualification exam during the mid-term and final exams. These questions will weigh 30% in their final grade (the rest of assessment weighs 70%).**

\*Assignments completed for this course may be used as evidence of student learning in accreditation reports. Students who do not wish their work to be used for accreditation purposes must inform the course instructor in writing by the end of late registration. Your participation and cooperation are appreciated.

Late papers and make-up exams: Notify the instructor if you are not able to turn in your research paper on time. With advance notification, 5 points will be deducted from the grade for late papers. For papers turned in late without advance notification, AND for all papers turned in later than 1 week, 10 points will be deducted from the grade. Make-up mid-term exams must be scheduled with the instructor and completed within 1 week (i.e., before the next class period). Make-up final exams must be scheduled with the instructor and completed by the end of final exams week.

- Select quantitative and qualitative data collection methods appropriate for a given public health context (MPH 02).
- Interpret results of data analysis for public health research, policy or practice (MPH 04).
- Assess population needs, assets and capacities that affect communities' health (MPH 07).
- Apply awareness of cultural values and practices to the design or implementation of public health policies or programs (MPH 08).
- Communicate audience-appropriate public health content, both in writing and through oral presentation (MPH 19).
- Characterize the biological, chemical and physical hazards affecting human and ecosystem health (EOH 01).
- Understand the effects of environmental contaminants and infectious diseases on the human body and apply knowledge of these factors in developing prevention and management strategies and making policy recommendations (EOH 02).
- Perform complex literature searches that aggregate results from multiple sources, assess literature quality, and demonstrate relevance to the student's work (EOH 03).
- Articulate the role of environmental health in the development of public policy and advocate for science-based environmental health policy positions (EOH 04).
- Evaluate the role of environmental and global health in the top challenges facing mankind, including overpopulation, energy, pollution, climate change, and infectious disease, to develop research directions and priorities (Ph.D. EOH 02)
