

ABOUT TONIGHT'S ARTISTS

For over a decade, since his orchestral debut (at the age of ten with the Moldova Symphony Orchestra performing Kabalevsky's Violin Concerto), Alexandr Dzyubinsky (1st violin) has impressed audiences with his unique style and breathtaking performances. As a versatile violinist, he is equally at ease as a soloist, chamber musician, and orchestra leader. In recent years, Dzyubinsky performed with Charleston Symphony, Aalborg Symphony (Denmark), and very recently joined the Las Vegas Philharmonic. He teaches in the Foundation to Assist Young Musicians' violins for kids program. Born in Kishinev. Moldova. Dzyubinsky began his musical training at the age of six and, in 1999, came to the United States where he continued his musical studies at the Lucy Moses School at Kaufman Center in New York. In 2004, he was accepted to the Juilliard School on a full scholarship and studied with Professor Masao Kawasaki. Dzyubinsky remained at the Juilliard School for his graduate studies under the tutelage of renowned violinist and pedagogue, Sylvia Rosenberg.

Korean-American violinist and pedagogue, Susan J. Kim (2nd violin), studied with Sally Thomas and Joel Smirnoff at The Juilliard School, where she earned her

bachelor and master of music degrees in violin performance. During her studies at The Juilliard School, Kim won the concerto competition and performed the Tchaikovsky Violin Concerto with the Juilliard Symphony. She was also the recipient of the Charles Petschek Award and the Michael Cohen Scholarship, given to exceptional students based on their musical performances. To achieve her goal of becoming a music educator, Kim pursued and received the doctorate of music education degree from Teachers College, Columbia University. Since then, she has published articles in American String Teacher journal and the String Research Journal and has presented her research at the national conference of the American String Teachers Association. Kim served as a faculty member of the Preparatory Division at the Mannes College of Music in New York City and had a thriving private studio in northern New Jersey. Her students have been accepted to world-renown conservatories and won orchestral positions and top prizes at international competitions. She also served as Assistant Professor of Music at Gordon College in Wenham, MA from 2009-2018. Currently, she freelances in the Las Vegas area and continues to teach students in her private studio.

As the daughter of two musicians in the New Japan Philharmonic, Ai Ishida Melby (2nd viola) grew up in Tokyo, where she eventually studied viola at the Tokyo National University of Fine Arts and Music. Her studies continued at Northern Illinois University, where she won the concerto competition performing Bartok's Viola Concerto. Her teachers and mentors include Tomako Shirao, Richard Young, Li-Kuo Chang, Yukiko Ogura and the Vermeer Quartet. Melby has performed with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Grant Park Orchestra, and as principal violist with Civic Orchestra of Chicago. She was also principal violist for the Western Piedmont Symphony in North Carolina and a founding member of Kontras Ouartet. She has traveled the world to appear at music festivals including the Schleswig-Holstein Music Festival, Norfolk Chamber Music Festival working with the Tokyo String Quartet, and Pacific Music Festival performing with members of the Vienna Philharmonic. From 2016-22, Melby was a member of the Chicago Philharmonic Orchestra, led the Midwest String Orchestra, and taught viola for Elmhurst University. In June 2022, she was honored to perform with the Avalon Ouartet for the Ravinia Steans Music Institute at the famed Ravinia Festival in Highland Park, Illinois. In August 2022, Melby moved to Las Vegas with her husband and two beautiful (and musically talented) daughters, where she has joined the faculty at the Nevada School of the Arts.

Cellist Mert Sermet (2nd cello), a graduate of New England Conservatory of Music and cofounder of the electric cello duo Bridge, has performed with many of the biggest luminaries of the classical, Latin, pop, and country music worlds. He performed at Carnegie Hall under the baton of internationally renowned conductor Daniel Barenboim in the same year as his multiple performances at the Grand Ole Opry with John Rich. In addition, he has performed with Natalie Cole, Nelly Furtado, Carlos Santana, Smokey Robinson, Stevie Wonder, Andrea Bocelli, Eagles, The Who, and most recently, Adele. Sermet is also a member of the Las Vegas Philharmonic, and has performed in several Las Vegas shows, including *The Lion King, Phantom,* Cheap Trick, *ShowStoppers*, Frankie Moreno, and *Frank: The Man.The Music.*

Omar Shelly (1st viola) was born and raised in Las Vegas, Nevada and has appeared worldwide as a violist while participating in several international orchestral training programs, including The Orchestra Now at Bard College, New York String Orchestra Seminar, Aspen Chamber Symphony, Britten-Pears Young Artists Programme, Orchestra of the Americas, Sphinx Virtuosi, San Francisco Orchestra. Symphony Youth YouTube Symphony 2011, and most recently as violist of the Equitas Quartet at both the National Orchestral Institute+Festival and the Pacific Music Institute of Hawaii. He received his bachelor's degree from the San Francisco Conservatory of Music studying with Jodi Levitz and his master's degree from the University of Michigan studying with Yizhak Schotten. Shelly is currently a section violist with the Las Vegas Philharmonic and has been a member of the orchestra since 2014.

Andrew Smith (1st cello) is a professor of music at UNLV, the principal cellist of the Las Vegas Philharmonic, and Artistic Director of the UNLV Chamber Music Society. He is an original member of the Camerata Deiá. a group founded in 2001 to be the resident ensemble at the Festival Internacional de Deiá, a summer festival in Majorca, Spain. He was also a founding member of the Adriatic Chamber Music Festival, a summer music program in southern Italy, where he taught and performed from 1998-2008. An active recitalist. Smith has collaborated with pianist Alfredo Oyagüez in cello/piano recitals in Spain, Italy, Germany, Sweden, Denmark, New Zealand, Argentina, Japan, Kosovo, Serbia, and Macedonia, Recent recitals include performances at the Emilia Romagna Festival, Accademia Musicale Chigiana in Siena, and Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall in New York City. The Smith/ Oyagüez duo released a CD titled Spanish Music for Cello and Piano on the Delos label in January, 2017. Of the CD, the American Record Guide said the duo plays "with verve and sensitivity," and recommended the disc "without reserve."
