ANTH 102 Course Description:

Biological Anthropology is concerned with the physical aspects of humanity in the past as well as the present. It is concerned with the origin, evolution, and geographical distribution of humans, the growth of populations and how they change over time, genetics and heredity, human adaptation and human diversity. This course will emphasize the origin and evolution of humans and their place in nature.

Main Objective of the Course: To educate students on evolutionary theory, basic population genetics, human variation, fossil hominids, the origin of modern humans, and ongoing biocultural changes.

Learning Objectives of the Course:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Integrate the basic principles of Mendelian genetics with principles of natural selection.
- Recognize the basic timeline of general primate evolution, including taphonomy, anatomy, & ecology.
- Identify key fossil hominins and how their anatomy reflects adaptation.
- Integrate fossil evidence in human evolution with genetic evidence of migration, via mtDNA and ancient DNA.
- Identify various sources of human variation and the ongoing biocultural evolution of our species
