

Title	Music Theory for Dancers Credits 3					
Description	A music fundamentals course designed especially for dancers dealing with the basic elements of music, with special emphasis on rhythm.					
Learning Outcomes	 Learning Outcomes: Students will develop an understanding of basic music terminology. Students will develop skills in rhythm and meter in order to enhance dance performance and choreography. Students will develop skills in basic eurhythmics and be able to translate rhythm into dance movement. Students will develop skills in music notation. Students will develop skills in basic rhythmic ear training and be able to write out and analyze rhythm from dictation. Assessments: Students will be assessed on movement projects, homework, written quizes, a midterm and final. Course Requirements: Attendance is mandatory according to the UNLV Code. Each student is allowed one unexcused absence unless there are extenuating circumstances. Six or more unexcused absences will result in the failure of the classwork and participation grade. All assignments must be turned in on time. Late homework will not be accepted. There will not be any make-up tests or quizes. Please see these two links for further information: Incomplete Grades—The grade of I—Incomplete—can be granted when a student has satisfactorily completed three- fourths of course work for that semester/session but for reason(s) beyond the student's control, and acceptable to the instructor, cannot complete the last part of the course, and the instructor believes that the student can finish the course without repeating it. The incomplete work must be made up before the end of the following regular semester for undergraduate courses. Graduate students receiving "I" grades in 500-, 600-, or 700-level courses have up to one calendar year to complete the work, at the discretion of the instructor. If course requirements are not completed within the time indicated, a grade of F will be recorded and the GPA will be adjusted accordingly. Students who are fulfilling an Incomplete do not register for the course but make individual arrangements with the instructor who assigned the I grade.
