About the panelists:



Washoe County School District Superintendent **Susan Enfield** serves more than 62,000 students in 100+ schools. She began her education career as a high school English, English Language Learner and journalism teacher in the San Francisco Bay Area and went on to a number of leadership roles in Washington and Oregon. She was named the 2022 Washington State Superintendent of the Year and the 2018 Superintendent of the Year by the National School Foundation Association.



Assemblywoman *Cecelia González* is a proud daughter of immigrants and advocate for women's health and criminal justice reform. In addition to her legislative role, she is currently pursuing her Ph.D. in multicultural education and teaching at UNLV and as a substitute in K-12 classrooms in the Las Vegas Valley.



Felicia Ortiz is the founder, president and CEO of PM Consulting Solutions, which focuses on technology-based project management for national and international clients. The daughter of an educator, she has always been passionate about education and committed to helping future generations. She is currently the president of the Nevada State Board of Education and a member of the WestEd Board of Directors.

Cindy Flores currently serves as director of the CCSD Family Support Center. In her 20 years of education experience, she's been the coordinator in CCSD's English Language Learner Division and an educator for the Los Angeles Unified School District. She holds a certification as a WestEd Quality Teaching for English Learners professional developer in Nevada and also helped lead efforts for the establishment of CCSD's new dual language program.



Prior to his role as the assistant superintendent of CCSD's English Language Learner Division, *Ignacio Ruiz* worked as the director of the language acquisition department in the Tucson Unified School District. In addition to his current role at CCSD, he is the founder and president of the Nevada Association of Latino Administrators and Superintendents

About the presenters:



Shartriya Collier is the associate dean of the Nevada State College School of Education and co-founder and director of the college's Sankofa Black student recruitment and retention program. With more than 21 years of experience as an educator, teacher educator, and parent/community advocate, her research interests include family literacy, the recruitment and retention of teachers of color, emergent bilinguals and literacy development and culturally responsive pedagogy.



Las Vegas native **Jordan Hankins** launched the Southern Nevada Black Educators Initiative, a non-profit organization with the goal of expanding Clark County's Black educator pipeline and offering support to Black preservice and in-service teachers through policy, mentorship and professional development. Jordan's advocacy work centers around her experience as a CCSD student who narrowly escaped the school-to-prison pipeline, and she is a strong advocate for educational equity and social justice.

Clamping The Leaky Pipeline: The Nevada Educator Preparation Institute and Collaborative (NV-EPIC) Teacher Licensure Model

Teacher shortages are at critical levels both in Nevada and beyond. This session highlights the NV-Educator Preparation Institute and Collaborative, an accelerated licensure/ degree program created to cultivate a next-generation approach to educator preparation customized for paraprofessionals and school support personnel.

About the presenters:



Jeff Briske is the director of Educator Development, Licensure, and Family Engagement and serves as secretary to the Commission on Professional Standards at the Nevada Department of Education. His background includes extensive experience in developing educator preparation programs, including the Teach Nevada Scholarship, Incentivizing Pathways to Teaching, and the Nevada Institute on Teaching and Educator Preparation State grants.



Professor **Kenny Varner** focuses on literacy, language, and cultural studies with an emphasis in glocality. In addition to his role as the director of the Gayle A. Zeiter Family Literacy Center, he is the principal investigator for three grants fueling the NVIForward program, which include the NV-Educator Preparation Institute and Collaborative, Nevada Institute on Teaching and Educator Preparation and Nevada Institute on Educator Preparation, Retention and Research.

As the principal of Paradise PDES, she has worked with the UNLV's College of Education to support preservice teachers at various stages of their development as they prepare to enter the classroom.
