UNLV Faculty Senate General Education Committee

Report to the Faculty Senate Chair on Committee Activities in the 2024-2025 Academic Year

May 10, 2025

The UNLV Faculty Senate General Education Committee (FSGEC) had a productive 2024-2025 academic year. The committee performed its normal duties throughout the year, held well-attended monthly meetings, and considered student and course petitions. The committee also completed its normal set of annual charges. It continued to perform extra research on the state of General Education at UNLV in collaboration with the Associate Vice Provost for Undergraduate and High-Impact Education.

COMMITTEE CHARGES FOR 2024-2025

The primary charges for this committee are, as detailed in the Faculty Senate Bylaws:

- **6.8...** shall periodically review policy regarding general education, recommending revisions in current policy whenever desirable. It shall also be responsible for
 - **6.8.1** Ruling on exceptions to the general education requirements and if necessary, granting modifications in the core requirements sufficient to restore previously existing graduation requirements in programs, departments or colleges.
 - **6.8.2** Reviewing content areas in the general education core, adding or deleting courses or content as necessary.
 - **6.8.3** Monitoring the general education program to ensure appropriate implementation.

After consultation with Associate Vice Provost for Undergraduate and High-Impact Education and the Chair of the Faculty Senate, the committee was also charged with the following for 2024-25:

- 1) To continue the recertification process and recertify social science, science, humanities, international, and multicultural classes in the current curriculum.
- 2) To work with faculty in corresponding colleges to ensure their milestone/ cumulative experience (ME/CE) class retrospectively fits with the ME/CE class requirement.
- 3) To work with faculty in corresponding colleges to ensure their constitution class retrospectively fits with the constitution class requirement.
- 4) To analyze the data collected from the 2024 survey of GE teaching faculty on their view on UULO and formulate appropriate strategies
- 5) To work with Honors College to formulate a plan for Honors College's general education
- 6) To generate a report on all activities, including a record of committee meetings and attendance, delivered to the Chair of the Faculty Senate no later than May 31, 2025.

In the rest of the report, we provide the details of the work that we performed.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE CHARGES

The committee was also charged with five specific charges (SC) for the 2024-2025 AY.

1. Work with Honors Colleges on their general education classes and curriculum. Representatives from Honors College and FSGEC have met multiple times. A proposal was developed to have a subcommittee involving Honors College's Associate Dean, FSGEC HC representative, an HC faculty member who is not on FSGEC, and an ex-officio of FSGEC member who is not HC faculty, to periodically review and approve

Honors College 400-level special topic seminar (HON 420, HON 430, HON 440). The proposal was approved with a vote of 7 Yes, 2 No, and 2 Abstain. Two courses were approved by the new HC committee.

2. Release of Milestone and cumulative curriculum course review to faculty.

With considerable support from Cass Shum and Nicole Stella, Mike Chin communicated with departments across UNLV to a) confirm current Milestone and Culminating Experience courses met expectations, b) notify departments from which the committee needed additional information to complete an assessment, or c) explain why current Milestone or Culminating Experience courses did not meet expectations and discuss plans for revision. Additionally, Mike completed reviews of updated materials as they were submitted.

3. Release of constitutional course review to faculty.

Members of the committee, including Lisa Johnson, William Robinson, and Michael Chin, were in charge of working with Cass Shum to release the results of a review of all courses that fulfill the general education requirements of the United States Constitution, the Nevada Constitution and both US Constitution and Nevada Constitution to confirm whether the courses met expectations agreed upon by the FSGEC.

Following the review in the last academic year, some courses were identified as not fully meeting the criteria for reasons including the description of learning outcomes, the absence of clear assessments, and the lack of readings about the constitution. An email notification was sent to the Honors College and the Chair of the History Department requesting a revised syllabus and additional justification for the following courses. Upon revision, the subcommittee re-evaluates those courses. All courses listed below are evaluated as fulfilling the UNLV constitutional course requirement until May 2030, after which a further review will be necessary. The departments are encouraged to update FSGEC when a major change in the course is made.

4. Review of UULO survey conducted in 2024, initiate the conversation of UULO revision.

The 2024 UULO survey results were reviewed. The survey results were entered into a tracking spreadsheet that showed the alignment between specific UULOs and related survey comments. Committee members [Jake, Dolly (Fine art representative), Amber (Mark), Lisa, Melissa (Engineering representative), Bill, (student representative)] then reviewed the tracking spreadsheet and made comments on how the UULOs may be updated based on the survey feedback. The committee also reviewed the UULOs from UNLV's peer institutions and summarized them in a spreadsheet. After the committee reviewed peer institutions' UULOs and survey responses, they met with Jake Thompson and Nicole Stella to get further guidance on the goal of the UULO revisions. The committee members assigned to this task will submit their versions of revised UULOs to Lisa Johnson by early Fall 2025. Given the change in committee membership, some members will be replaced with their college's representation in the process. The Fall 2025 semester will start with a review of these individual submissions and planning for a listening tour so that the committee can gain insight from faculty members on suggested UULO revisions.

5. Survey faculty opinions on double-dipping and policy related to that.

After reviewing preexisting information and getting information from FSGEC as well as advising team during the General Education Conversation Tour, there is a general consensus that double-dipping can promote students' progression. However, there are concerns about triple-dipping.

A related issue that occurs is that there is are increasing number of students' petitions related to waiving the distributive requirement based on their prior major. Two solutions were proposed:

- A. Students can submit a petition to their advisors for their switched major. The FSGEC chair will evaluate whether the students get 12 credits for their former major. If it is the first switch, the FSGEC chair will approve the petition, and if it is the second switch, the FSGEC committee will adjudicate the petition. Approved by FSGEC unanimously.
- B. The general education core (including first-year seminar, second-year seminar, English, Math, and Constitutions) courses may simultaneously satisfy the General Education distribution area (Humanities and Fine Arts, Life and Physical Science, and Analytical Thinking, Social Science) requirements. The 6 semester credits may then overlap with rather than add to the total General Education credit requirements. No course can fulfill three general education requirements at the same time.

A (switching major distribution requirement) is approved to ensure the Chair's prerogative to handle the student petition related to distribution area waiver for the first major switch, as long as the student has 12 credits from the prior major.

The FSGEC chair is working on soliciting inputs from all colleges' deans on revised double-dipping policy. The petition will be discussed in the 2025-2026 academic year for potential implementation in Fall 2026.

6. Recertify Gen Edu courses and release the results to faculty.

The Office of Decision Support (Skip) is developing an SAS interface to facilitate Gen Ed course recertification and ensure that timely information is pulled and updated. A preliminary interface is developed. Once the interface is finalized, the committee will continue its work on recertification in the 2025-2026 academic year.

OTHER COMMITTEE DISCUSSIONS AND CONSIDERATIONS

The committee considered a variety of relevant topics at its meetings beyond its charges. These included the following:

NWCCU accreditation report

As UNLV goes through the NWCCU accreditation, FSGEC prepared a report and attended an accreditation meeting. **2024 NWCCU General Education Report.docx**

Engineering BA Social Science Waiver

The committee has worked with Associate Dean Yingtao Jiang and Dean Rama Venkat to extend the social science distribution waiver to its new BA in Engineering Technology. The committee will reevaluate the waiver in 2035.

Chair election and Committee Representation

Cass Shum was reelected as the FSGEC committee chair for 2024-2026. Mike Chin was elected as the FSGEC vice chair for 2024-2026 with the expectation that he will step into the role of chair in 2026. The outgoing committee member was identified. A reminder was given to the departments to ensure the continuity of colleges and schools' representation in the committee.

FINAL NOTE

The committee maintained its commitment to committee transparency and record preservation by distributing all committee documents electronically and by preserving all committee documents, most importantly, meeting agendas, meeting minutes, all meeting presentation files, and student and course petitions, on a shared electronic drive.
