World Culture Requirement Description

The College of Liberal Arts (COLA) World Culture requirement is designed to provide students the opportunity to learn about the unique history and development of a culture outside the political and geographical boundaries of the United States in order to encourage global awareness. Successful completion of any two of the following courses will fulfill the requirement. Both courses must be in a subject other than the student's major. Please verify with your academic advisor. Policy on the World Culture requirement for foreign students: A student who was born and raised in a country or countries other than the US, and whose native tongue is a language other than English, and who has completed at least two years of high school in a country other than the US and a language other than English, is exempt from the College World Culture requirement.

Note: World Culture courses which satisfy the UNLV General Education International requirement are indicated with an asterisk.* World Culture courses which satisfy the UNLV General Education Multicultural requirement are indicated with two asterisks.**
