

CHICAGO (18TH EDITION): NOTES AND BIBLIOGRAPHY

The **Chicago Manual of Style** has two alternative systems of citing sources, named Author-Date and Notes and Bibliography. In this handout, we review the Notes and Bibliography system. Unlike the Author-Date system, there are no in-text citations. Instead, **superscript numbers** (numbers placed above the text) are used to indicate a citation which in turn refers to **footnotes or endnotes**. Finally, there is a **Bibliography** page at the very end of the document listing all the sources for one last time.

FOOTNOTES & ENDNOTES

Footnotes are pieces of text consisting of citations and are placed at the bottom of each page. Endnotes serve the same purpose, with the difference being their position: endnotes are presented at the end of a document (before the Bibliography) as their names imply. You should use either footnotes or endnotes consistently when citing sources.

When a source is cited for the first time, it is given as a **full citation**. When the same source is cited again, **shortened citations/notes** are used to avoid redundancy.

HOW DO CITATIONS LOOK?

Below are examples of full and shortened citations, along with the corresponding bibliography entry for a select group of source types. Examples are taken from the Chicago Manual of Style's website (the list is not exhaustive).

Note that the bibliography page should come at the very end of the document as a new page and should be titled "Bibliography." Do not bold, italicize, or use quotation marks around this title. Entries on the reference list should be alphabetized and single-spaced, with an extra space between them. Make sure to use hanging indents (0.5 inches). The reference list does not include a page number.
