ABOUT CSUN


CSUN is UNLV's Undergraduate Student Government! As representatives of the undergraduate student body, they work hard to create a thriving campus community and to enhance each student's college experience.

CSUN is composed of three branches: Executive, Legislative and Judicial.

The Mission of the Consolidated Students of the University of Nevada is to empower student leadership, to advocate for the enhancement of the student experience, to provide for fiscally responsible decisions, meaningful dialogue, and demonstrate continued commitment to sharing the student voice.

Executive elections take place every spring semester.

The Executive Board is composed of the Student Body President, Student Body Vice-President and the Senate President. The Executive Branch oversees all CSUN activities including marketing efforts, elections, and legislative lobbying trips. The CSUN Executive Branch consists of the Executive Board along with the Attorney General, and Chief of Staff. The Executive Branch is also made up of all Directors, Associate Directors, and Assistant Directors assigned to various departments within CSUN.





Through CSUN student government I have found that my biggest passion is serving others and turning visions into reality. Learning of how difficult this past year has been for all UNLV students, I believe it's time that UNLV live up to its true potential by implementing student-focused initiatives and bringing our university together as a community again. In my time of service, I have lobbied for student issues, passed various resolutions in the Senate, and built a strong track record of work that is just the beginning of what our campaign will accomplish once we take office. 

James Wright A Connected Future


