including diabetes, hypertension, and small injuries.


When asked specifically about her educational experience at the School of Nursing DNP program, Laura shared:

“Ever since nursing school I knew I wanted to become a nurse practitioner and to get my doctoral degree. Being much more interested in practice than research, the DNP degree was a natural choice for me. Within two years of graduating with my bachelor’s, I started the BSN to DNP advanced practice program at UNLV. I was thrilled to be accepted and felt well taken care of since day one.

Doing my BSN to DNP was admittedly very challenging, but a confidence building opportunity that I do not regret. While learning clinical skills in my FNP courses, I was learning the bigger picture in my DNP courses. Challenges I had not felt confident facing, such as business management, health care administration, and conflict management were well covered in the DNP courses within the context of what I would be doing in health care as a provider. Even though I did not have additional clinical training in my DNP course work, I gained a greater vision of how my care impacts populations, why we do what we do clinically, and how I can make a difference by bringing evidence to the bedside. The ability to read research articles, identify discrepancies between practice and evidence, and put evidence into action with careful planning and diligence would be my favorite take away from my experience in the BSN-DNP program at UNLV.

Now as I look forward to starting my first job I feel confident in what I have learned and eager to pair my excellent education with experience. I am proud to be a graduate of UNLV!”

A Lifelong Learner: Nursing Student Guides Others

An undergraduate and graduate UNLV alumna, Alena Grewal realized the quality of UNLV nursing programs and wanted to be part of it. In her role as a Nurse Educator and Advanced Practice Registered Nurse (APRN) as a Family Nurse Practitioner Board Certified, she has been teaching the clinical portion of the Nursing Care of the Adult Medical-Surgical Patient course. Alena joined UNLV School of Nursing in Summer 2017, and since then, she has been guiding nursing students on the Dedicated Educational Unit (DEU) at Summerlin Hospital Medical Center. As the Clinical Faculty Coordinator (CFC) for the DEU, as well as her continued exposure to direct patient care in

advanced practice, she has had the opportunity to influence and cultivate nursing student knowledge, skills, and abilities. In 2019, she was selected by the UNLV as "Outstanding Teaching by Part-Time Instructor."

Alena enrolled in the Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) program at UNLV in the Fall of 2019 and has now defended her DNP Project Proposal titled: *Comparison of 12-hour Biweekly Shifts Versus 6-hour Weekly Shifts on Learning Outcomes and Fatigue in Nursing Students on Dedicated Educational Unit*. Additionally, Alena submitted an abstract for the Western Institute of Nursing's (WIN) Annual Communicating Nursing Research Conference, and was accepted for the WIN Research and Information Exchange poster session. Although the WIN Conference has been cancelled, she is looking for the first opportunity to present the poster in the future. Furthermore, in 2020, Alena received the Vital Affair Entrepreneurial Excellence Award because of her passion for teaching and using innovating ideas to develop and operationalize a modified clinical DEU model to improve learning experiences for her students in clinical settings.

Alena wanted to share why she decided to pursue a doctoral degree "I believe we as nurses are life-long learners, and completing the DNP program will serve as a vehicle toward the achievement of my educational, professional, and personal goals as a Nurse Educator and APRN. My utmost desire is to assume a leadership role in providing a high-quality, evidence-based education to the future generation of nursing students and also prepare me to lead others in the efforts to improve the delivery of valuable healthcare services to individuals and communities in need, here in Nevada."
