Perspectives on Place

- Proprietary places addresses, buildings and other owned locations. Ownership is critical.
- Proximal places street
 segments and other small
 contiguous aggregations of
 proprietary places.
- Pooled places large
 aggregations of proprietary or
 proximal places, such as
 neighborhoods.



Defining Guardianship

Dimensions of capable guardianship at residential places (Reynald, 2010) that deter offenders:

1. Available to supervise

Presence

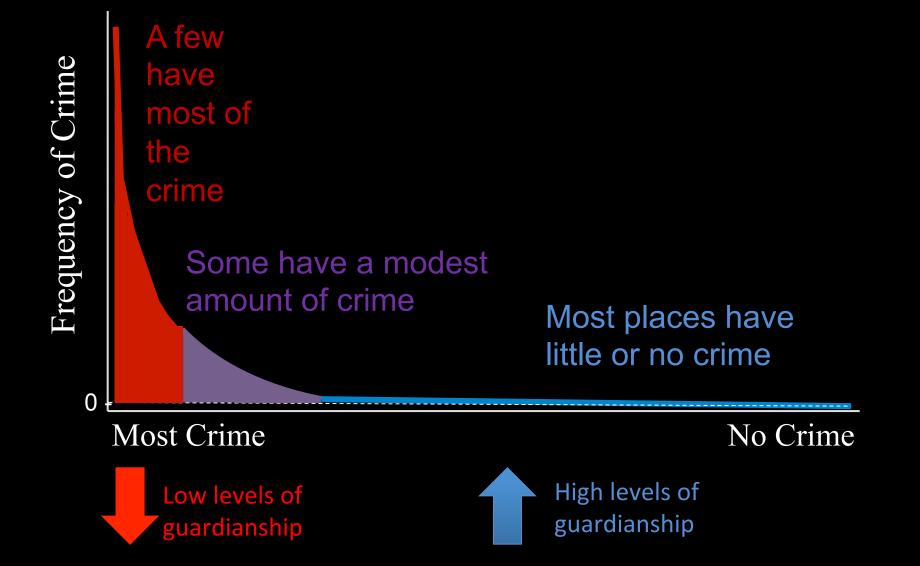
2. Ability to detect potential offenders

Awareness

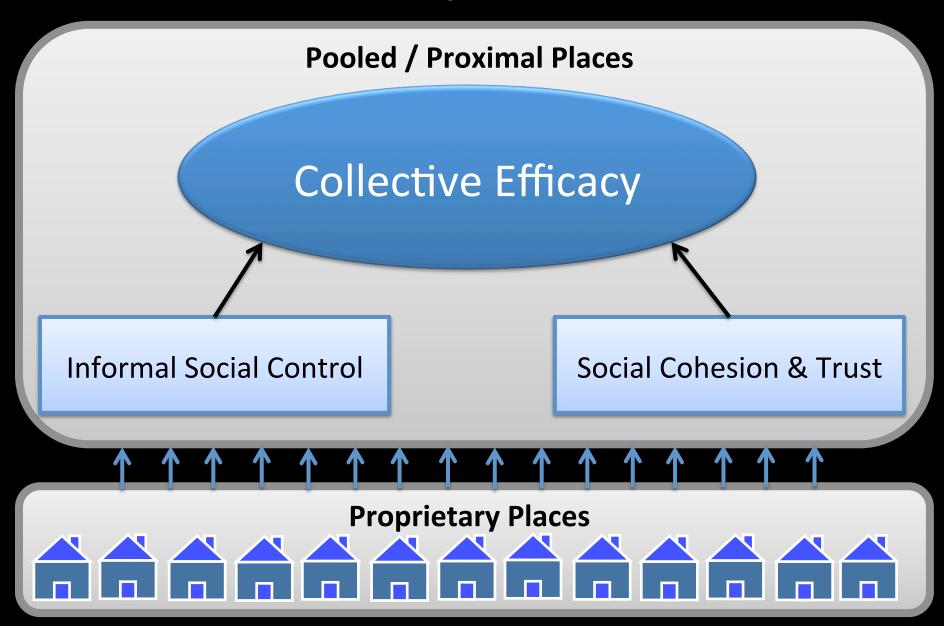
3. Willingness to intervene when necessary

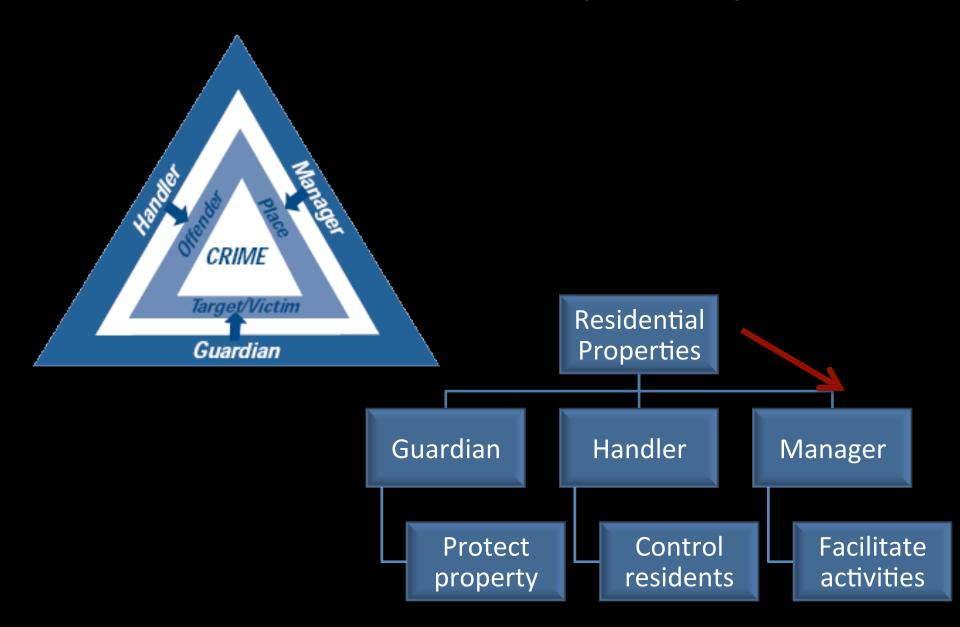
Guardianship-Place-Crime Relationship: The Iron Law of Troublesome Places

Place Management

Place managers engage in (4) general processes:

- ORGANIZE PHYSICAL SPACE-- design, location selection, construction, repair, and upkeep;
- REGULATE CONDUCT -- promotion and prohibition of activities;
- 3) CONTROL ACCESS -- the inclusion and exclusion of people; and
- 4) ACQUIRE RESOURCES -- the acquisition or manipulation of money and other resources that can be used for 1 through 3, as well as any profit.

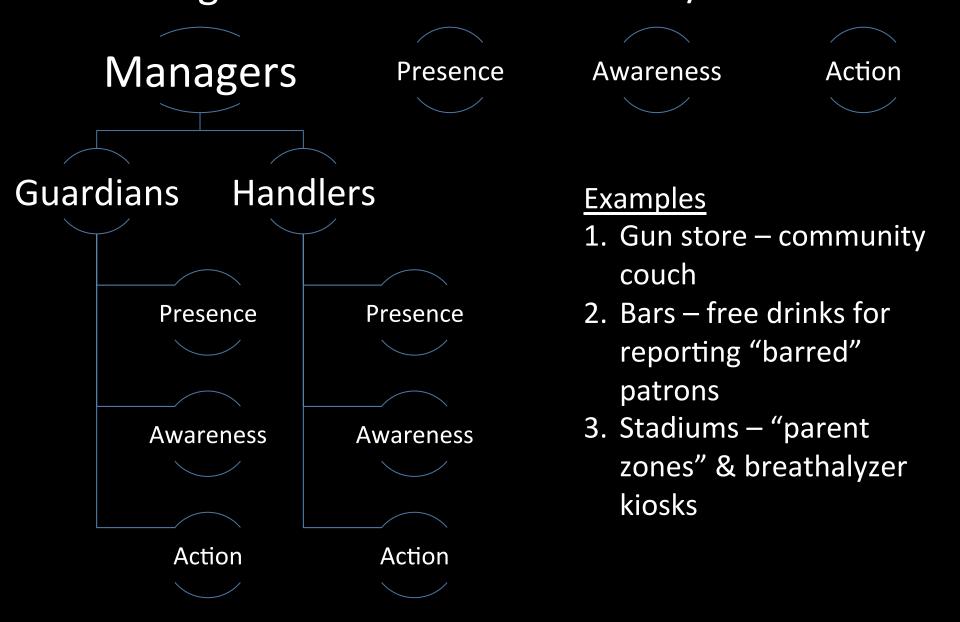

| Management | Type of Crime Opportunity | | |

| style | Residential Burglary | | Assault in Bars |
| Suppressor | Installs alarm system after buying house | | Provides intensive training for new staff |
| Reactor | Adopts large dog after being burgled | | Employs bouncer after major brawl |
| Enabler | Fails to replace broken lock | | Does not have a "stop-service" policy |
| Promoter | Hosts drug parties to flaunt gun collection | | Advertises to fans of opposing teams |

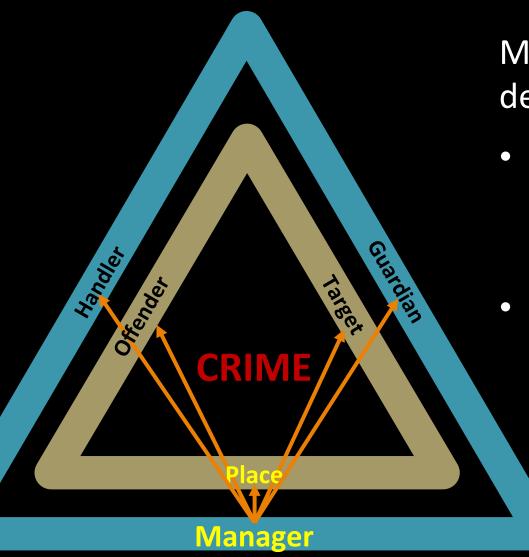
Place-Based Deterrence: Management Creates Guardians/Handlers

Guardianship (and Deterrence): A Function of Place Management



Management determines whether...

- Offenders, targets, guardians, and handlers are present
- Guardians/handlers are made aware and encouraged to intervene
